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## Fire, police youth respond to disaster drill

The Smalltown Junior Firefighters and Junior Police Explorers conducted a mock mass casualty training drill recently at the Smalltown Volunteer Fire Station. The training involved multiple stations where the event participants learned about advanced first aid and patient care, mass casualty triage, scene control and personnel management.

Bill Fisher, the Emergency Services Officer, e-mailed this training situation: "The drill will cover the following scenario: A rescue alarm with entrapment and injuries involving a mid-sized school bus and a small compact vehicle. Each station will be supervised by either a firefighter or paramedic who has been trained in mass casualty incidents."

This event gave the juniors and explorers a look into the operations of a mass casualty incident. It will help prepare them for their future roles in the fire and police departments.
