### Message from the Fire Commissioner:

First and foremost I would like to draw your attention to the Manitoba **Emergency Services Conference that** will be held October 11, 12, 13th. The Conference Committee has listened to the concerns and recommendations of the Fire Service and have taken the steps to return to offering a variety of training opportunities that includes formal accredited and certified courses, as well as one and two day informational seminars. Leadership training will be available for Company Officers, as well as practical hands on training for new recruits and veteran fire fighters. I strongly encourage all departments to support this unique training opportunity that we have to offer here in Manitoba, and urge you to send in

your applications starting August

On May 31, 2012 The Provincial Public Education Committee met to develop a new provincial public edu-

cation strategy, and to set the priorities for the 2012/13 year. The highlight of the public education program this year will once again be delivery of four new fire and life safety education trailers to Eastman, Northeast, Oak Lake and the North Mutual Aid and Training Districts. This

successful initiative has been made possible through the support of the Red River Mutual Insurance, the Manitoba Burn Fund, The Office of the Fire Commissioner and the Manitoba Association of Fire Chiefs (MAFC). The first of the trailers have arrived and is presently being decaled and outfitted with the final training equipment and props.

Other areas within the public education program that you will see our resources dedicated to this year include partnering with the Manitoba Burn fund and the Winnipeg Fire and Paramedic Service (WFPS) during the kick off of Fire Prevention Week (October 7 – 13, 2012). The theme for FPW this year is " Have 2 ways out". This is a timely message given some of the tragic events that we experienced in Manitoba this past

strengthening of our Youth Fire Stop (YFS) network over the coming year.

Over the past months the OFC operations staff under the direction of DFC Robert Pike has been busy completing many of the Municipal Fire Protection Surveys that were requested by Municipal Officials and the fire service. FP Surveys were completed

for the RM of Bifrost and Town of Arborg; the RM and Village of Lac du Bonnet; as well as the RM of Macdonald. One of the common concerns that we have heard throughout these surveys is the need for a long term strategy to lead the Manitoba Fire Service over the next 5 - 10 years. In response, the OFC has recently called together representatives from the necessary stakeholder including AMM, MAFC, WFPS and the OFC to begin the development of a provincial fire service strategy that will address issues such as recruitment and retention of volunteers, training and education, communications, leadership and service delivery models to support future needs. The committee will also look at our provincial mutual aid system to ensure that it remains strong.

We look forward to working with all of our stakeholders on all of these important initiatives over the coming months. I hope to see as many of you as possible at the fall Emergency Services Conference, and once again remind you to ensure that you are supporting this very unique opportunity provided to the Manitoba Fire Service.

### **BRANDON FIRE & EMERGENCY SERVICES**

Road Shows/Rodeos - Taking Firefighting Skills to the Public





June is a month of Road Shows and Rodeos to celebrate the successful completion of another Fire Prevention school year for Brandon Fire & Emergency Services. These events are coordinated through our Prevention Division to bring fire safety to the schools in a fun event atmosphere. We also modify the itinerary of both for public events or by special request. Road Shows are events for K-6 students that rotate between 4 pre-set stations all targeting a different area of a firefighter/paramedic's job.

#### 1. Fire Safety Trailer or Scavenger Hunt

Safety Trailer – students will have an opportunity to tour our Safety Trailer and experience real smoke conditions that occur in a fire situation.

Scavenger Hunt - Using the gym or a classroom as a starting point, the students will be asked to go searching for the fire safety features in their own school.

- 2. Ambulance A fully equipped ambulance is set up for students to experience oxygen masks, heart monitors, blood pressures.
- 3. Aerial Unit Our Quint is set up and the firefighters demonstrate how the "Ladder" works and give a close up of our breathing apparatus.
- **4. Water Fun** Students are given a chance to get a hands-on feel for using a fire hose to put out a fire. Staying dry is not an option.

The Rodeo provides an opportunity for Grade 7 & 8 students to become familiar with some of the skills and equipment required by firefighters in a fun and competitive way. The teams participate in five relay stations:

- 1. Bucket Brigade Relay Teams compete by filling pails from a fire hose and transporting them to the fire (garbage pail).
- 2. Turnout Gear Relay Students race to get dressed in complete fire gear as quickly as possible.
- 3. Hose Hook-up Relay Teams hook a fire hose to a hydrant, connect 2 sections of hose together and then connect a nozzle. The first team to spray water wins.
- 4. Dummy Drag Relay Teams must recover and rescue a victim through an obstacle course.
- 5. Tug of War Teams line up as they would in a normal tug-of-war with one exception the middle line is a spraying fire hose. Losers get wet!

Since January 2012, Brandon Fire & Emergency Services has held 11 Road Shows (~3000 youth), 7 Rodeos (~650 youth), and attended 3 special events (excess of 1000 people) to demonstrate these programs. Not only do the youth get to see if they have any of the skills needed to perform the job of a firefighter/paramedic, the events create some very powerful childhood memories that are reminders for life. The other benefits include providing another venue for learning about fire safety and emergency response for all age groups. As a department, we enjoy great PR and interaction with our community.





### First Nations Fire Protection Survey

The Province of Manitoba and the Assembly of Manitoba Chiefs entered into an agreement that would see the Office of the Fire Commissioner conducting a Fire Protection Survey on all of Manitoba's 63 First Nations communities. The purpose of the Fire Protection Survey is to determine the current state of fire protection in each First Nation community.

In late January the surveys began, and the Office of the Fire Commissioner with assistance of the 7 Tribal Council Fire Service Officers hit the road and the ice road running. Since the end of January, 58 of the 63 communities have been completed. During the community visits we have been able to participate in Public Education sessions, School and Day Care Inspections and Training Activities with the local Fire Departments.







## FireSmart The History Of FireSmart Canada Partners in Protection (PiP) is an Alberta based multidisciplinary non-profit association,

Canada made up of members representing national, provincial and municipal associations, government departments responsible for emergency services, forest and parks manage-

ment, land use planning and private business and industry.

The mandate of Partners in Protection has not changed since its creation, which is; to facilitate interagency cooperation in the promotion of awareness and education aimed at reducing risk of loss of life and property from fire in the wildland/urban interface. The association is committed to raising awareness, providing information and developing forums to address common problems that encourage community-based initiatives to reduce the risk of property losses and enhance safety in the wildland/urban interface. Partners in Protection has been successful in developing and distributing information about wildland fire prevention and methods to lessen the effects of destructive wildland fire to homes, communities and industries in the interface. In 1999, PiP created the FireSmart \* brand and published a comprehensive technical manual titled "FireSmart Protecting your Community from Wildfire". This manual has been printed in both official languages and has been distributed across Canada and internationally.

Since its inception in 1990 PiP has evolved from the group of eight to a membership of over 60 organizations across Canada. Representatives from eight provinces and territories are currently members of the association. Four provinces, one territory and the USA are represented on the Board of Directors. A recent partnership with the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) will provide excellent opportunities for international cooperation and sharing of resource materials between the two organizations concerning the delivery of wildland/urban interface (WUI) education and wildland fire risk mitigation programs.

In 2008 PiP was invited by the Canadian Council of Forest Ministers (CCFM) to develop a proposal for a National FireSmart program. In response, PiP has developed a FireSmart Canada program that would address the goals necessary to protect lives and properties across Canada identified in the Canadian Wildland Fire Strategy developed by senior officials of CCFM. A key element in this proposal is the development of a FireSmart Communities Recognition program based on the model developed by Firewise Communities/ USA®. This program has nearly 700 recognized communities in 41 states throughout the United States. The program provides the criteria, training and education necessary for a community to become certified as Firewise.

In the spring of 2012, PiP held the first FireSmart Liaison Train the Trainer and FireSmart Communities Recognition Program workshops in Kamloops, B.C. co-sponsored by Thompson Okanagan Interface Society, B.C. Fire Commissioner's Office, B.C. Wildland Fire Management Branch and the City of Kamloops. The objective is to provide FireSmart Communities training and information to individuals identified by federal, provincial, local and first nation's agencies and governments as key contacts for neighbourhoods interested in becoming FireSmart. Information on the symposium can be found at; http://www.toic.ca/events.php. PiP plans to hold at least three more workshops in Canada during 2012.

These key elements, along with several other components of the National FireSmart Initiative put forth by PiP, combine to encourage shared responsibility for fire protection and to empower individuals, communities and industry to directly reduce the risk from wildfires in or near populated areas.

### Are You Landing Zone Ready?

STARS air ambulance has cared for and transported patients for over 27 years in Alberta and is dedicated to providing a safe, rapid, highly-specialized emergency medical transport system for the critically ill and injured. Teamwork with local firefighters is a fundamental part of STARS service. That involvement and partnership has included everything from securing safe and appropriate landing zones, landing the helicopters and working alongside STARS medical crew at the scene of emergencies. Now STARS is in Manitoba.

Through a 10-year funding agreement with the Manitoba government, STARS established a permanent foothold in Manitoba in February 2012 and is now up and running smoothly. Starting with a 12 hour, 7 day a week schedule, service was expanded on summer long weekends to a 24 / 7 rotation. STARS has flown over 300 missions since April 2011 and plans to go to a full 24 / 7 schedule in 2013.

As part of Manitoba's emergency response system, firefighters have been training to work with STARS on scene calls. For training opportunities, you can call (204) 786-4647.

Part of the training to local emergency services is through STARS community outreach program. "Partnering with the local emergency service teams is essential to our success." says Troy Pauls, Community Education Leader, Winnipeg. "Our community outreach program works to facilitate the exchange of information between STARS and the organizations it serves, ensuring the most effective patient care and transport possible."

Topics covered during an Operational Outreach session can include:

- Accessing STARS
- Landing zone preparation and helicopter safety
- Preparing a patient for air medical transport

Recently, training was held in June in Neepawa, Erickson, Winkler, Clandeboye and Warren/Woodlands and in July STARS went to Beausejour, Steinbach, St. Jean-Baptiste/Letellier and Stonewall.

For each mission, there are two pilots and a flight nurse and flight paramedic both trained in critical care. A STARS emergency doctor is also available for all missions, for either consultation or to respond along with the crew on the aircraft.

Since launching STARS service, the Springfield Volunteer Firefighters and Paramedics have responded to five calls. One of the first was an electrocution. Within minutes of the call a hydro bulldozer had cleared snow for a 20m x 20m landing zone and the firefighters guided the helicopter in. More recently, there was an incident involving a motorcycle at Deacon's corner. Dick Vlaming, Springfield Fire Chief said, "STARS is a great tool and great for our customers. The public doesn't know yet the skill and equipment that is on that machine."

"Deacon's Corner was my first close-in scene call in Manitoba and it went off without a hitch. I have a feeling of confidence coming in to a scene call and seeing that firefighter with his arms in the air." said STARS pilot Greg Chorney. "I know then that the training is going to pay off with great teamwork."


#### ERICKSON & DISTRICT FIRE DEPARTMENT RECEIVES A NEW PUMPER


On June 19, 2012 the Erickson & District Fire Department received its new pumper that was manufactured by Acres Industries (formally Green Acres Industries) from Wawanesa, MB. This new unit replaces our previous pumper that served our community well for 22 years.

This pumper features some of the newest technology available in order that the truck meets all current specifications as well as being able to meet the needs of the fire service for years to come.

The design and build process took approximately 18 months from start to delivery date. The department struck a build committee that worked with both the town and municipal councils and fire department members as a team to ensure that the final product would meet our needs as a growing rural community in a cost effective manner without sacrificing truck capability. We started with a needs assessment and a review of past incidents to determine what we should incorporate into a new pumper to serve the community for the next 20 years.

During the design process, the committee looked at many newer units across the province and consulted with them about what went into their





Another area of the truck that was designed with intent was scene lighting. The unit features the 4 of the newest LED flood/spot lights (20,000 lumens each) to provide maximum scene lighting to rescue or night operations without the added bulk of a portable generator or light stands. The rescue style body allows for full depth compartments to allow for ample amounts of storage, which combined with slide outs in the bottom compartments allows for maximum efficiency when packaging the necessary equipment into the truck.

It is not often that a small rural department has the opportunity or ability to design and purchase a new pumper unit. There was countless volunteer hours spent on all aspects of the design and build process to get the unit specifications we wanted as well as to add some personal touches, a new department logo, custom stripe package and the addition of the Fireman's Prayer on Maltese crosses installed on both sides of the pump house. Decaling and design consultation was provided by Off the Wall graphics of Brandon. We were successful in obtaining a pumper incorporating the latest technology in an overall package that stands out as well. We thank the many firefighters, departments and suppliers that we spoke with and consulted during the process to bring this truck into service. Special thanks to the department members and their families who were actively involved with obtaining this truck.

### Fire and Emergency Services personnel hone their search and rescue skills

On Feb. 18th Arborg-Bifrost Fire and Emergency Services hosted a recertification training day for Ground Search and Rescue.

Thirty people from several Winnipeg, North Interlake and South Interlake fire departments took part in the recertification training.

We haven't had a course like this before, it helped get everybody on the same page, "said volunteer fire fighter and search and rescue team leader, Sue Medwid.

Randy Antonio Ground Search and Rescue coordinator with the city of Winnipeg Police Service and Special Ops, and Scott Kerbis, Assistant Fire Commissioner from the Office of the Fire Commissioner were the instructors for the day. They were at the Arborg Fire Hall to update the group on search techniques.

Ann Nelson, and emergency helicopter pilot with Prairie Helicopters Inc. in Gimli, was also on hand to teach the group.

"They were all really happy to go up. I think that was the highlight of the day, "Medwid said.

The helicopter may have drawn the attention of Arborg residents as it flew around town for the day. Trainees were given GPS coordinates and had to find specific location in town using them. It gave rescuers an opportunity to practise with new GPS locaters they received in 2011.

At least eight helicopter trips were made throughout the day, with four fire and emergency personnel in the helicopter at a time.
