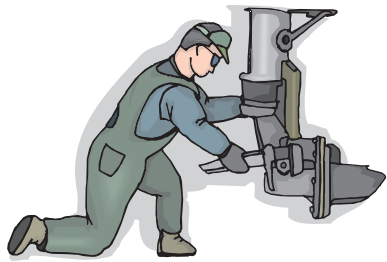
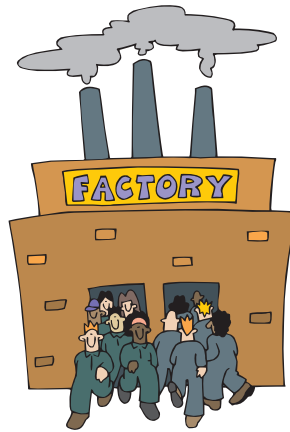


Fire Consumes Jobs

No Fuel, No Fire!

Good housekeeping in the workplace will eliminate material hazards – the fuel – that allows fire to start and grow.

KEEP storage and work areas clear of trash.

CLEAN UP spills – place oily rags in a covered metal container.

KEEP all waste containers securely covered.

KEEP access to emergency equipment clear.

KEEP all exits clear

Good Housekeeping reduces the risk of fire destroying your workplace ... and your job!

Hot Works

Know and practice your company's hot works program!

HAVE the right fire equipment available, and know how to use it.

KEEP flammable and/or combustible materials a minimum of 10 meters (30 feet) from work area.

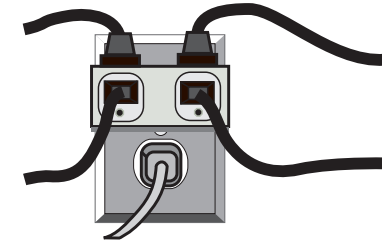
PROTECT combustible materials that cannot be removed.

CHECK regularly for explosive or flammable dust and/or vapors.

PREVENT heat from transferring through walls and floors to combustibles.

USE only properly-maintained equipment.

Hot work is safer when you follow the program.



Electricity

Industry depends on electricity to operate. Under proper conditions, electricity need not be feared. Keep yourself and your workplace safe from electrical fire by understanding and respecting electricity.

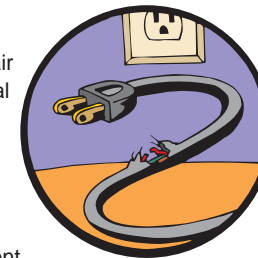
KEEP electric motors properly cleaned and maintained.

ALWAYS use the proper size circuit breakers and fuses.

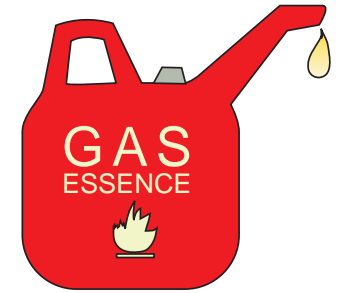
DO NOT overload electrical outlets.

DISCARD or repair damaged electrical cords

ALWAYS follow proper standards and codes when using or installing electrical equipment.



Even a small electrical fire can cause a major interruption in operations ... and your job.



Flammable Liquids and Gasoline

Flammable liquids and gasoline can cause an explosion.

STORE and transport flammable liquids in approved containers.

USE flammable liquids only in ventilated areas.

DO NOT refuel equipment while still hot.

CLEAN UP spills immediately. Remember, it is the vapor given by flammable liquids not the liquid itself, that ignites and burns.
